

# Eight local citizens are presented Heritage Day awards for work

Eight community members were this year's recipients of the Milton Heritage Day awards.

Councillor John Challinor and Mayor Gord Krantz were among several presenters at the award ceremony, which was held Sunday at Hugh Foster Hall. The Milton Historical Society and LACAC co-hosted the event.

The award for an Addition to a Heritage House was shared by two families.

John and Loni Brechin live in a Victorian-style home and wanted to build an 'L' shaped addition to the east side of their home which would include a porch. Bev Gray, a design technician, worked with them to create the home they wanted.

Barny and Susan Henderson needed to make their red brick, cottage home handicapped accessible and also wanted to add a main floor bedroom. The Hendersons turned to architect Brian Williams to design the addition.

The award for New Home Built on an Infill Site in a heritage district went to Margaret Lawson.

Her new home on Victoria Street is situated on a recently severed lot backing onto Rotary Park. Her red brick, one-storey house has inviting porches at the front and

back and large windows. Her architect, Mr. Williams summed up a description of the house with "It was like putting a Queen Anne dress on a modern bungalow."

Diane Robnik was the recipient of the Education Award. She's currently studying museum management and curatorship at Sir Sandford Fleming College in Peterborough. During the summer of 2000, Ms Robnik worked in Milton at the Halton Region Museum. She wrote and documented with photographs an extensive paper on preventative care for cemeteries, using Bronte Pioneer Cemetery as her focus.

Konrad Richter was the recipient of two awards for Visual Arts.

His first award was for his design of the Heritage Milton Poster, which is being sold as a fundraising project. The second award was for a picture he drew of the Waldie family's blacksmith shop and home, using old photographs supplied by the family.

The Writing Award went to Marsha Waldie for writing the Historic Homes and Buildings of Milton, Volume II.
